Regenerative Injection Therapy (RIT)/Prolotherapy – Part I: Clinical Anatomy

At the end of this session, participants will be better able to review the basic science and principles of the healing process; identify degenerative, inflammatory, regenerative/reparative pathways; discuss indications and contraindications to RIT; identify appropriate solutions for injection; identify normal and pathologic anatomy of the occipital, cervical, thoracic, lumbar, and pelvic areas; differentially diagnose chronic, painful conditions of these areas.

At the end of this session, participants will be better able to outline the evolution of the new program requirements for an ACGME accredited fellowship program in Multidisciplinary Pain Medicine (MPM); discuss the most important changes that will occur with the implementation of the new program requirements; list the specialties that are expected to participate in an ACGME accredited fellowship in MPM and sit for the Subspecialty Board examination; explain the concept of adult-directed learning and how this concept applies to training programs in MPM; list and describe the six broad competency areas of resident and fellow training that were created by the ACGME; discuss how to expose MPM fellows to elements that make up the six ACGME competency areas; evaluate the fellows in each of these areas to document that they have achieved competence in the subspecialty of Pain Medicine.

4:30 – 5:30 pm: **“Functional Medicine Approach in Complex Regional Pain Syndrome and Neuropathic Pain,”**

At the end of this session, participants will be better able to define the discipline of Functional Medicine, including the systems approach using the Functional Medicine Matrix; identify and evaluate the pathophysiology including differential diagnosis of complex regional pain syndromes and several types of neuropathic pain syndromes; apply the principles of Functional Medicine to evaluation and care of patients with these disorders (CRPS and NP) and recognize the fundamental values of this approach.
